

Latest edition

The Ballad Repertoire of Anna Gordon – Mrs Brown of Falkland (ed Sigrid Rieuwerts). This volume has now been printed and delivered to members. We hope that members will enjoy this important addition to the STS's corpus of ballad editions.

Volumes in preparation

The Society expects to have a good number of publications over the next couple of years. These include:

Older Scots: A Linguistic Reader (ed Jeremy Smith). This is a major addition to the STS's publication list, and will be made available both as a volume in the Society's main series and in a separate paperback edition. The volume contains an invaluable introduction to Older Scots as a language, followed by a range of freshly transcribed examples from literature, letters, and legal documents. Publication is anticipated for the end of this year or the beginning of 2012.

The Poems of John Stewart of Baldynneis (ed Katherine McClune). Publication of the first complete edition of Stewart's works since Crockett's one-volume STS edition of 1913 is anticipated in 2012.

Archibald Pitcairne. The Phanaticks (The Assembly) (ed John MacQueen). This is a major new edition of this satirical and scurrilous drama by Pitcairne (1652-1713). Again p publication is expected in 2011 or 2012.

Shorter Scottish Medieval Romances (ed Rhiannon Purdie). This volume will contain some exciting discoveries unearthed during the editing process.

Additionally, the Society is preparing an extensively revised version of parts of its edition of *Gavin Douglas, The Eneados*, containing revisions to the text, glossary, and notes by Priscilla Bawcutt, and work on the textual notes by Ian Cunningham.

The above is of course only a selection of titles on which the Society is at present working but will serve to give members a taste of what is to come.
