Renaissance: Scotland and Europe 1480-1630


World Congress of Scottish Literatures 3-7 July 2024

The preliminary programme for the World Congress of Scottish Literatures is now available. With over 100 papers submitted, the Congress promises a varied programme. Noting that Nottingham is "indelibly marked by an outlaw imagination", organisers are looking forward to a Congress "held in that spirit". You can find out more <u>here</u>.

The National Library of Scotland's next major exhibition will run from 21 June 2024 until 26 April 2025 and will explore the links between Scottish people, places and objects and their counterparts in Europe. The exhibition showcases items linked to the Scottish Court, literature, scholarship, faith, crafts, music and science. Experience the Northern Renaissance through listening to contemporary sacred and secular music and to excerpts from prose and poetry in Scots, Gaelic, Latin and French.
